**Instructor Background:** Joseph J. Moseley II is a 30-year veteran of the Chicago Police Department serving as a patrol officer in the 20<sup>th</sup> district and tactical officer in the 003<sup>rd</sup> District. Joseph J. Moseley II served as a Homicide Detective in Area 1 Violent Crimes Unit, and as one of the first members of the Chicago Police Department's Cold Case Squad. Joseph J. Moseley II is certified as a law enforcement instructor by the Illinois Standard Training Board and is also certified as a Lead Homicide Investigator. Joseph J. Moseley II has served as a trainer for the Chicago Police Department recruits, pre-service detective, sergeants, lieutenants, captains and the Cook County Sheriff's Department as well as many suburban police agencies and other governmental agencies. Educationally, Joseph J. Moseley II earned his undergraduate degree from Chicago State University and his graduate degree from Saint Xavier University (Chicago) with a Masters of Business Administration with a certificate in Concentration in Training and Performance Management. **Course Description:** This course examines the theories and practices of strategic and operational planning for crisis and emergency management. Students will learn and practice decision making during crisis events and situations. They will be able to differentiate between decision-making in a crisis environment and a normal work environment. Emphasis will be placed on the emergency leadership model versus the designated leadership model. Students will explore ways to coordinate public safety response with private security entities as well as governmental agencies.

**Learning Outcomes/ Competencies:** Students in this course will: Be able to recognize the necessary management techniques needed during an ever changing emergency situation and the tools necessary to achieve the desired outcome. Students will learn the importance of candidate selection and how it affects future outcomes for an agency. They will learn the importance of training and discipline at all levels of the department to insure desired responses in crisis situations and selecting future leaders for the department.
