Course Description:	
<p>Students will use a variety of illustration and graphic design software for illustration, technical drawing, composition and implementation of created art into page layout. Students will also incorporate traditional drawing skills and scanning methods with digital illustration and drawings. Composition, digital color specification and current graphic design trends will be emphasized.</p>	
Learning Strategies:	
<p>Brainstorming, guided demonstrations, videos, films, image presentations, hands-on experimentation, focused exploration, free exploration, modeling, guest speakers, lectures, group discussions, field trips, collaborative play, creative inquiry, case studies, design thinking methodology.</p> <p>While much of the course work will be done in the classroom, students are expected to practice and produce work on their own as well.</p>
