Course Description:

This course examines the nature, concept, and measurement of juvenile delinquency. Theoretical models are used to explain the causes of delinquency. An overview and history of the juvenile justice system's philosophy and practice are covered. The role of the police, the juvenile trial process, and both community-based and secure correctional sanctions are reviewed.

Responsibilities	
Attending Class	<p>You cannot succeed in this class if you do not attend. We believe that intellectual growth and success in higher education occur through interaction in the classroom and laboratories. However, we do not want to penalize students for participating in college-sponsored events. When you miss class because of a college event, you must give notice of your absence in advance, and you are responsible for all missed work. Being absent doesn't excuse you from doing class work; you have more responsibilities to keep up and meet the objectives of this course.</p> <p>No more than <u>Four</u> (4) absences allowed; requests for an exception MUST be in writing within one week of returning to any class. Turning In Your Work	<p>You cannot succeed in this class if you do not turn in all your work on the day it is due. All homework/assignments are to be submitted when due; late work will be downgraded. After one week late work will NOT be accepted. Medical or other excuses at Instructor's discretion.</p>
Using Electronic Devices	<p>All electronic devices <u>shall</u> be turned off PRIOR to entering the classroom, whether or not class has started. If you have an electronic textbook permission to use your device may be granted. If you text or access the Internet for other purposes, you may be asked to leave, in</p>

	which case you will be marked absent. Any medical or emergency exceptions by Instructor approval only.
Participating in Class	<p>You must be on time, stay for the whole class and speak up in a way that shows you have done the assigned reading. If you are not prepared for class discussion, you may be asked to leave, in which case you will be marked absent.</p> <p>You must prepare for every chapter we cover fifteen (15) important factual statements: give the statement, the page number, and the location on the page (top, middle, or bottom).</p>
Doing Your Own Work & Notifying the Instructor of Dishonesty or Cheating	<p>All students enrolled in a criminal justice course must adhere to the CRIJ "Honor Code" which states that every student MUST make the Instructor aware of actual or suspected cheating by any student.
