Biological Bases of Behavior Case Conceptualization Requirements/Rubric

The case conceptualization should consist of a mental health problem/disorder, substance problem/disorder or dual diagnosis. Please choose an area you are interested in at this time. Also, relate conceptualization to class handout.

The following need included:
A) How long has individual had the problem/disorder? Set the stage for your client 5 pts/5
B) Current medications if any? How long, changes, etc? - 5 pts/5
C) Biological/Psychopharmacology - utilize one of the chapters from your book to incorporate into your conceptualization (medication processes, history, behaviorism, biological/genetics among other) (One must include biological processes)? - 15 pts/15
D) Current treatment regimen/ CBT, Motivational Interviewing, Adlerian, Narrative, etc 10 pts/10
E) Choose a famous person with similar issues. Then, discuss the person, problem and progression or lack thereof during their journey 10 pts/10
F) Written case summary to be handed into the instructor the day it is due in the syllabus. Should be about 4 to 5 pages - 15 pts/15
Individual Paper Rubric
Each student will complete a 5-page research paper on one biological aspect of behavior and the brain. You can choose a disorder to relate to as well. The following will need included in the paper:
A) Biological Nature/History discussed – 10 pts/20
B) What happens in the brain related to the biology? – 25pts/30
C) Utilization of two scholarly journal articles – 10pts10
D) Grammar, Content – APA formatting, 12-point font, double space – 40 pts/40
