**Learning Outcomes/ Competencies:**

Students in this course will:

- Develop a basic understanding of fundamental immunological processes.
- Identify the major cellular and tissue components which comprise the innate and adaptive immune system.
- Acquire a basic understanding of the fundamental of the Major Histocompatibility Complex.
- Understand how immune responses by CD4 and CD8 T cells, and B cells, are initiated and regulated
- Be able to discuss how the immune system distinguishes self from non-self.
- Describe the differences between and necessary integration of innate and adaptive immunity.
- Describe major modern techniques used in and influenced by immunology.
- Know why, and how the immune system is selective, tolerant and has memory.
- Explore how immunity relates to disease.
- Understand how infectious microbes interact with the immune system.

This course meets the following learning objectives for the Biomedical Science program:

  - Students will demonstrate substantial and up to date core knowledge of broad areas in basic biomedical, translational, or clinical research.
  - Students will demonstrate the ability to accurately and critically evaluate their own scientific work and work of others.

  - Students will demonstrate advanced understanding of a range of technical and conceptual approaches used in biomedical research.
  - Students can design, carry out, and interpret research projects that generate new knowledge that advances the biomedical science and human health.

  - Students will demonstrate mastery of a range of technical and conceptual approaches used in their selected research area.

- Ethics and Advocacy:

**Course Description:** A 3 credit hour course. BIOL 360 is an introduction to experimental and theoretical foundations of immunology. The course focuses on concepts, landmark experiments and recent advances. Topics include innate and adaptive immunity; structure/function of antibody molecules and T cell receptors; regulation of immune responses through cellular interactions. Applications of concepts to medically significant issues (vaccines, transplantation, inflammation, autoimmunity, cancer, HIV/AIDS) are discussed. Interpretative analysis of experimental data is emphasized.
